


Guide







Introduction

The *Beef Princess of Practical County* tackles some unique issues facing agriculture today. The story is told through the perspective of a 7th grade girl, Libby, as she experiences showing cattle at the county fair for the first time.

In this companion guide, you will find a variety of activities for each chapter including discussion questions, vocabulary, writing prompts, literary devices, art focused activities, and extension activities.

Questions

Use these questions as discussion starters or as reading checks for whole-class reading.

Write Away

Use these reading prompts as a way to focus student attention on a specific topic from the chapter. These prompts will challenge students to think more critically about various events that took place in the chapter.

Power Words & Vo-Cow-Bulary Words

These are vocabulary words that can be found through each chapter that students may be unfamiliar with. "Power Words" are more traditional vocabulary words where "Vo-Cow-Bulary Words" are words that are associated with agriculture.

Literary Devices

Use these prompts to help strengthen your students' understanding of various literary devices. Some literary devices you'll see throughout the guide include using metaphors, foreshadowing, character analysis, hyperboles, and more!

Art-Wise

Have fun and get crafty with these art activities that are a fun way to integrate ELA and art! Get students thinking about the story and about agriculture while encouraging various art skills.

Extension Activity

Use these extension activities to further strengthen student understanding about agriculture. These extension activities challenge students to connect themes in the story to real life topics and information in the world of agriculture.

CHAPTER 4: STUBBORN AS A MULE

LITERARY DEVICES

Simile: The chapter title is an example of a simile. Re-write the titles of Chapters 1-3 as similes. Make sure the simile make sense as a title for that specific chapter.

ART-WISE

The author paints pictures with words — she describes Mule's eyes as having the color of a dark blue summer night. How would that look on a black calf? Draw and color a picture of Mule to match that description. What would be in the background?

CHAPTER 5: AUTUMN SURPRISE

LITERARY DEVICES

Point of View: Libby says, "technology that made farming more efficient also changed the face of the family farm." What does she mean by this? Do you think her family members would agree or disagree and why?

ART-WISE

Color or paint a picture of an autumn sunrise!

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

Persuasive writing: Some say that our current school calendars were set up to help support agriculture so that children could be home to help on the farm during planting and harvest. Would you support moving to a full year school calendar since you are likely not involved in planting and harvest? What changes would need to be made to your school to allow this to happen?





CHAPTER 6: SOUP FOR THANKSGIVING

QUESTIONS

- What is a 'hopper' that Mom makes Frannie?
- Why is everyone shocked to see the Darlings in a soup kitchen?
- Why were the Darlings serving at Thanksgiving?

WRITE AWAY

The Ryans have several traditions, including how they open their Christmas presents and working in the soup kitchen on Thanksgiving. What traditions do you have in your family?

LITERARY DEVICES

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

Have students list their favorite Thanksgiving/holiday meals and then list all the ingredients that it takes to make that meal. Where do those ingredients come from?

LITERARY DEVICES

Imagery: Use descriptive adjectives to describe the barn clothes of both Carol Ann and Libby.

Libby has a harsh reaction to her mother when she suggests shopping. Why do you think she is so strong in her words? Be sure to include with whom she shares her true feelings.

LITERARY DEVICES

ART-WISE

Design your own County Prince or Princess outfit using a variety of small pieces of fabric!

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

Even though Libby names one of her calves Piggy, pigs are very different than cows! Read through the AITC Pork Ag Mag to learn more about pigs. Then, compare and contrast pigs and cows.

CHAPTER 14 & 15: THE CLOCK STARTED TICKING & A GIRL THING

LITERARY DEVICES

Metaphor: Create a sentence with a metaphor that describes Mule's personality.

ART-WISE

Libby feels differently about the Princess contest than the Darling sisters do. Use emojis to show how they feel.

LITERARY DEVICES

Hyperbole: Have you ever tasted a new food that you absolutely loved or absolutely hated? Write a sentence using hyperbole to describe your reaction or thoughts of that experience.

ART-WISE

Libby says there isn't a spider in the barn weaving messages over Mule's head. What message should be there for Mule? Draw a picture of a web with a message.

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

Mule may not be considered a vegetarian like Libby, but he is an herbivore. The food they eat takes much more to break down than our human stomachs can handle. Learn about the ruminant digestive system!

CHAPTER 18 & 19: GRANDDAD'S SECRET & ANOTHER MAN'S TREASURE

LITERARY DEVICES

Idiom: An idiom that is commonly used is "One man's trash is another man's treasure." What does this mean?

ART-WISE

Libby says that her enthusiasm has been 'zapped.' Draw a cartoon of this onomatopoeia.

EXTENSION ACTIVITY

Grandad is proud of his heritage. What is your heritage? Interview an adult in your family to create a family tree and learn about your family's heritage.

QUESTIONS

- Describe how the Darlings participate in the fair.
- What do you think Ohma's problem really is? Why is she so cross all the time?
- What does Libby notice about the Darling steer?

- Why does Libby feel sorry for Ohma and her steer?

WRITE AWAY

Dad asks Libby if she has any doubts. Describe Libby's doubts and think back to the beginning of the book for other examples. You might refer back to Chapter 8 (page 72) for Libby's thoughts of Mule at the fair.

ART-WISE

LITERARY DEVICES

ART-WISE

- · What does Dad mean when he says showing cattle can be a girl thing?
- What is going to happen on Saturday to all the cattle shown in the fair?

LITERARY DEVICES

LITERARY DEVICES

Onomatopoeia: The author describes the sound of the crowd as a chattery buzz. Create a list of onomatopoeias to describe other sounds you might hear at a fair. Make sure to include what that noise is describing.

ART-WISE
