Turkeys





The turkeys we raise today look very different from their wild ancestors. The Eastern Wild Turkey is the only wild turkey species in Illinois. They have brown feathers and can fly. They even sleep in trees to protect themselves against predators. The Broad-Breasted Turkey is one of the most common turkeys raised for meat. It has white feathers and can't fly because it is larger and has more meat on its body.







Our farm is over 90 years old. We raise 10,000 turkeys every year on our farm in Morton, IL. We are a large family that works together to provide fresh, all natural Thanksgiving turkeys to families across the state and country.

What kind of turkeys do you raise and why did you choose these breeds?

We raise a breed called Nicholas turkeys, which are all white. All of our turkeys are females (hens). Sometimes, we get a few male turkeys (toms) that quickly become much larger than the rest of the females. Nicholas turkeys are a breed of turkey that grow quickly and have a higher meat yield.

Do you raise your turkeys from chicks or do you hatch them on the farm?

We get all of our turkeys the day they are born from a large hatchery in Indiana. This happens in July. Once we bring them home, they are raised directly on our farm, allowing us to personally oversee and maintain their entire life cycle.

What kind of housing and food do you provide your turkeys?

All of our turkeys are raised in a large, open range facility with soft bedding and automatic dispensers for water and feed. They are able to roam around and get their food and water throughout the facility as needed. We also grow 1,500 acres of corn on our farm, which we feed to our turkeys so they have a healthy, all natural food source.
